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Michael's Letter

Back from Bruges...



We're just back from a week in Bruges and it held a few unexpected surprises. I didn't expect to find a museum dedicated to chips (or frites). Not that I was allowed to visit it. Helen considered it a waste of money, which is fair enough. I wasn't allowed to go to the chocolate museum

either – perhaps provident to save me from temptation!

I didn't expect to find all year round Christmas shops, filled with an array of Christmas decorations, which apparently do good business all year round. I learned of Germany's Christmas pickle tradition. A gherkin like bauble is hidden on the Christmas tree and the child who finds it apparently gets an extra present from St Nicholas.

Rabbits were everywhere – well in many of the shops (edible and decorative) to mark the commercial face of Easter – the only one represented. They also like to eat rabbit stew in Bruges, much to mine and Helen's dismay!

The church of the Holy blood has what is claimed to be a piece of blood stained cloth taken by Joseph of Arimathea from Jesus body. Oh that it were true! Let's face it, it's very unlikely! The vial containing the relic, ornately sealed both ends in gold is reverently brought out at noon for the faithful to venerate.

I lined up to take a look at it, though venerating was a step too far. I did pause to quietly thank Jesus for shedding his blood for me. You will not be surprised to read that a collection box is placed beside the case the relic is kept in as you approach to view it.

Bruges is a beautifully preserved city of Historic architecture and impressive and imposing churches (mostly Catholic) with beautifully decorated interiors. Museums contain magnificent works of art of the Flemish masters, with many depictions of Jesus to pause and reflect upon.

I was surprised to see one of these shells less than 20 yards from our hotel. These are found on the pilgrimage route, known as the 'Camino de Santiago'. To think that in centuries past Bruges to Santiago de Compostela in northern



Spain was an established pilgrimage route. At a distance of over 1529 miles it tests the limits of endurance! The church that neighbours our hotel has information for pilgrims inside so to some extent it still happens today. The scallop shells serve as waymarks on the pilgrimage



and I think in medieval times were given as proof of completion.

Now the furthest pilgrimage walk I have been was a mere 4 day trail. Now I can honestly say, to my disappointment I didn't experience a profound encounter with God on the journey. No epiphanies and I didn't feel any closer to God for it. I had a very enjoyable set of walks, which I'm sure did me good physically and mentally, but that was it. My romanticised image of a profound spiritual journey with the Lord didn't come to pass.

So where did I go wrong? Firstly you'll gather that going on a pilgrimage for me isn't about going to venerate some holy shrine or relic. It's about a dedicated journey with God away from the everyday distractions.

So why didn't it work out? I'm sure you can think of several possibilities. But one reason you probably won't have thought of and quite possibly won't agree with was that it was too comfortable. What I mean is that I was never in a situation outside of my comfort zone. I went home each evening because home was close enough to do that. I wasn't in a situation that made me more dependant on God and more focused on Him.

Let me give you a different example. I could fast for a day and find it beneficial. But I found that if I fast for 3 days I notice something different. My focus on God increases substantially for significantly more of the time. By the way, I am merely sharing my own experiences. This is just me! I'm not saying 'go and do thou likewise'.

But in light of my experiences and my still romanticised view of pilgrimage, I have for several years wanted to take on the Camino de Santiago. It is a route declared one of the 3 great world pilgrimages by Pope Alexander VI in the 15th Century along with Jerusalem and the 'Via Francigena' route to Rome. It began in the 9th century when the supposed remains of the apostle James were discovered.



There are several different routes, but the most popular is the French one which is about 500 miles. The original route known as the primitive route is quite a bit shorter I think.

So why haven't I embarked on this yet? Maybe I'm just to comfortable! The main reason is my inability to get my head around using a map and compass effectively. Yes, the route is marked out but I can guarantee it will not be marked out enough to make up for my lack.

It means that when I do finally get started on it, I will not be able to do it alone which would be my preference. I will need to enlist a group of Christians to travel with including some who can navigate effectively. We shall see!

Well I've gone a bit off-piste in terms of the subject matter, but this is a very longwinded way of saying we had a nice holiday!

Verse of the Month..

But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect, 1 Peter 3:15

Wise words from Peter. Just prior to this in verses 13-14 he says... 'Who is going to harm you if you are eager to do good? But even if you should suffer for what is right, you are blessed. "Do not fear their threats; do not be frightened."'

Peter is specifically talking of persecution. But he maintains that the usual and expected outcome for those who do good is reward not punishment. Good will result from doing good. Nevertheless, those who do right before the Lord may still suffer for doing what is right.

Doing good in spite of the opposition, criticism even persecution can help in leading the other to turn from their ways and do what is right.

The next verse illustrates how, when believers keep doing right, it may win through in the end,

keeping a clear conscience, so that those who speak maliciously against your good behaviour in Christ may be ashamed of their slander. 1 Peter 3:16

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you...Acts 1:8a

God's Grand Plan

When we accept the gift of salvation, God begins the process of healing all that is broken within us.

1 Peter 1:13-16






Having A Mary Heart In A Martha World £14.14
